The Library of Congress provides a rich set of pre-coordinated subject headings related to libraries and social change. The most important of these are **Libraries and community** and **Libraries and society**, both of which may be subdivided geographically. Additional pre-coordinated headings that are relevant to this topic, all of which may be subdivided geographically, include:

The Library of Congress has also established several relevant subdivisions, all of which may be subdivided geographically, under the general headings **Libraries**, **Librarians**, and **Library science**:

Libraries – Aims and Objectives	Libraries – Public relations
Libraries – Censorship	Librarians – Professional ethics
Libraries – Cultural programs	Library science – Moral and ethical aspects
Libraries – History	Library science – Sociological aspect

When works are published dealing with ethnic groups and libraries in America, the Library of Congress will establish headings combining the name of the ethnic group with the word libraries. Established headings of this sort include:

African Americans and libraries
Asian Americans and libraries
Cambodian Americans and libraries
German Americans and libraries

Hispanic Americans and libraries
Hungarian Americans and libraries
Mexican Americans and libraries
Romanians and libraries

The free-floating subdivision **Political activity** can be used under names of corporate bodies, classes of people, types of industries, etc; for example, **Librarians – Political activity**. And the free-floating subdivisions **Social aspects**, **Political aspects**, and **Philosophy** can be used under topical headings; for example, **Libraries – Social aspects**, **Libraries – Political aspects**, and **Library science – Philosophy**.

Finally, the Library of Congress provides a number of topical headings, all of which may be subdivided geographically except as noted, that can be combined using Boolean **and** in a subject keyword search with the truncated term **librar*** to search for works on libraries and social change:
